From 4⁰⁰ P.M. I had my two English classes, and at night, my Eng. Bible class. Today I learned by postal that the boxes of goods which came from Smith's store, San Francisco, arrived at the station, but because my name was not spelled correctly it has been there for several days, as they knew not to whom it belonged. I suppose it will reach me tomorrow sometime. Must work on a speech for Chugakko tomorrow for Monday.

In A.M. I did some reading on the subject of education in America. Just before noon I went to the bank and drew out some money. In the meantime, Mr. Suzuki sent me a year book from which to take some statistics. At about 5³⁰ P.M. Mr. Clark called. After supper, I took a short walk. At 7⁰⁰ P.M. Mr. Suzuki came for me to give him my speech which I expect to deliver on Monday. His brother came with him. He wants to enter my English Bible class. Had a talk with Cook at night about different foods for the table. From now, for a while, I will have 2 eggs and a persimmon for breakfast. When the oranges come, I will put them in the place of persimmons. I now stop the 3^{go} of milk each day. A very fine day. Sent some post to mother.

In A.M. I went to Sunday School and preaching. Also at night went to preaching. Today is the annual baseball & tennis match game. So we had fewer at Ch. & S.S. than usual. Talked in A.M. and 6 at night. At night Mr. Sakahashi took charge of the meeting. Mr. Yamamoto complains of not feeling well. Rohei seems to have gotten worse. I suppose it will not be so long until he drops off. At 5⁰⁰ P.M. I went to Mr. Painter's where I attended the services and was also prevailed on to eat supper. Returning, I found Mine waiting for me, but left it for tomorrow. In P.M. Mr. & Mrs. Davison called. I did not know that they had returned from America. He arrived at Kumamoto Friday & she about a week ago. He had been in Nagasaki. Mrs. Bondeink at Saga is in a hopeless condition. She may drop off at any time.

In A.M. I rather prepared for my address at the Middle School, which I delivered in P.M., Mr. Suzuki interpreting for me. Rec'd. a letter from Mr. Kuhn. He is not sure that the Soga Doctor helped him. Had Mr. Sakahashi write 2 letters for me. In P.M. I went to Middle School - 1⁰⁰ - 5⁰⁰. The exercises were quite long, - divided into two parts. I was the first number on the second part. Spoke on "Student life in America." The entire program of 27 numbers was in English. Some of the students did very well. Shortly before it was over, Dr. Van Wickleton and then Mr. Monk came. After the exercises the teachers took us through the building. At night Mr. Yamamoto called and asked if I had my sermon for tomorrow night written out. I have so I gave it to him. Mr. Matsushige will interpret, studying the manuscript beforehand.

In A.M. did some studying with Mr. Takahashi. Had him write several letters. In P.M. At night we had services at which Mr. Akimoto spoke on Luther at Worms. I then spoke on the Reformation's influence on Science and Religion. Mr. Matsuoaka interpreted for me. There were 117 persons present. An excellent audience. The services lasted until 9:45, Mr. Akimoto having made an extremely long address. I hope we can have as good audience tonight. No American mail after today, I hope to be able to settle back in regular study.

In A.M. studied Had Mr. Takahashi one hour. Recd. letters from mother, Mr. J. V. Cline, Mr. Chris X. Hansen. In P.M. I tried to study some, but my book "Isumi to wa man zo ja." is very difficult for me. I hope it will become easier later on. At night we again had services at the church. Dr. Fukuda spoke. Mr. Chiga, because of his sick child could not come. Dr. Fukuda's talk was very interesting they say. About 120 people were present. We are very much gratified because of the attendance. Recd. check of \$216.62 from Mr. Cline and yen 167.50 from Mr. Hansen. Sent both to bank in Nagasaki. I must call at the Davison's soon.

Spent Am. in various little things. Mr. Takahashi came but asked to be excused as he was busy with preparations for this evening. After having him a few moments, I excused him. Tried to find a cloth blackboard in Kumamoto, but could not. I then wrote to Mr. Walvoord asking him to have the student in his school who makes them to make one for me. In P.M. called on Dr. & Mrs. Davison. They run the music box for me. It is very nice. After returning from there, I went to the tennis court a moment, then to the new Ymc & Bldg. which is to be dedicated Saturday. At 6⁰⁰ went to Mr. Yamouchi's where about 100 persons gathered. We had singing, prayer, speech by Mr. y., Magic lantern, Bevra, etc. Retained at 10⁰⁰ P.M. Fine day. Had hair trimmed in P.M.

Mr. Takahashi did not come this A.M., he being busy with the newspaper. I studied alone. At 3⁴⁵ my Eng. classes came. Not all the students came. Also at night the Bible class came. I took a little bicycle ride after noon. Repaired my bicycle chain case which had been making a noise. At night Mr.— of the Bible class had several questions to ask. He seems to be pretty well informed on the Bible. I intend to have a personal talk with him as soon as I can. I wonder if he would become a Christian. I pray to that end anyhow. Mr. Yamouchi was to have called in P.M., but did not come. Mr. Takahashi spoke to the students of my classes in P.M. on Martin Luther. I wish he would confine himself to the way of salvation. It is that that these people need.

Studied in A.M. after attending to my mail. At 4^o P.M., I went to the G.M.C. hall where the opening exercises were held. About 150 or more people were present. Dr. Eastmore of Nagasaki delivered the principal address.

On leaving I, and I suppose all, were presented with a box of coffee most tastily made. At 4^o P.M. Mr. Suzuki, brought me three pictures as a gift for my speaking before their school last Monday. Two of them were painted by 4th year students, and one by a fifth year student. All are fine, but the latter is excellent. They are just what I was thinking of buying somewhere. Will have them framed. Shortly after 4^o P.M. Mr. Ijima came. From now, I will have him every Saturday A.M. to help me on the language.

Cloudy-Rainy

In A.M. went to Ch. As it is Terchosetsu, and all students had to go to the school, we could have no S.School. There were 7 at Ch. in A.M. and 9 at night. Mr. Matsumoto, a Kurume member, a soldier came both in A.M. & in P.M. Kurume soldiers are here today on drill. At noon Mr. Endin called inviting me to take tea with him at 4^o P.M. I did so and then went with him to services at Mr. Painter's. Mrs. Yamamoto told me tonight, at services, that she will go to Hakata tomorrow to enter the hospital. In the first part of Sept., I offered to pay her hospital bill if she would enter the hospital. I do not know why she has not done so before. This will mean that I must pay about 50^o yen out of my pocket for it. But I hope the poor woman will get relief.

Cloudy.

Left Kumamoto on the 11²⁴ train. Before this I had my check of 600.47 yen cashed at the Yu Hachi bank. I took this and went to the Nijo bank, where I drew out 100. yen from my running acc. and deposited 400. yen on a three months deposit at 5%. I then had 300. with which I started out on my monthly trip. Arrived at Kurume at 2:02 P.M. Left on the 3⁵⁵ train arriving at Saga at about 5⁰⁰ P.M. Went to the Kolekwan hotel. After supper called at Mr. Nedai's. At Kurume, I raised the salary of Mr. Yonezawa from 35.00 to 40⁰⁰ yen and Mr. Shattuck made from 11⁰⁰ to 16⁰⁰ yen according to Mr. Hansen's letter. Mr. Yonezawa thinks that he now ought to be paid a balance to make up for this rate counting from Jan. 1 of this year. Last night I slept but little, was rather sick all night. Feel rather stupid today.

In A.M. just as I was about to start to Mr. Nedai's from the hotel, he came. Same had a sedan until noon. I find that he actually did pass the yochien son over to Kawase San, and that he persists in what he calls his resignation as president of the yochien. I do not like his attitude at all. Just before noon, I sent a note to Kawase San asking her to meet me at Mr. Nedai's at 3⁰⁰ P.M. to have the yochien acc. & he did so. Just after noon until 3⁰⁰ P.M., I spent the time at Mr. Peele's. He was absent, but Mrs. P. Mr. Hoeyle, and Mr. Handelich were there. Spent a most pleasant interval there. It was the first time I have met Mr. Hoeyle. He arrived in Japan last Thursday. His sister, Mrs. Handelich, who has been at Mr. Peele's for the last two months is showing some signs of improvement, but is by no means yet out of danger. I stopped at Tatsubachi on my way to Nakata, as it had become late afternoon.

Fukushimachi - Hakata

After taking a bath and waiting long and patiently for my breakfast, I left Fukushimachi for Hakata on the 10.01 train. Went to the Beniu hotel and at once went to Mr. Yamamoto's home. In P.M. I again went to his home, when I held our Monthly Soc. I remained in Hakata all day for the purpose of calling on Miss Finley at night, to which I looked with much pleasure, but when I called, I found her to be absent. She was at prayer meeting. Left my card. Took a long walk just before supper. Told Ryohei this P.M. that we would discontinue the 3rd gen Jappi. I find from him that Wada has been up here talking big talk about me and the soldiers. He saw our ant hill and thought it to be a mountain. I will report me to Brown San when he returns in Dec. Won't he scared!!!

Hakata - Omura - Kumamoto.

Ther. THURSDAY, Nov. 7, 1907 Wea.
Rainy.

The hotel maid called me at 4¹⁵. I got up and went to the depot. Took the 5²⁵ train and arrived at Omura at about 8⁴⁵. Just before reaching town, it began to rain and continued all day. Turned cooler. Ate a bentō which they prepared for meat the hotel. For dinner, I ate but a little mochi. So by supper time I found that I had had a pretty good fast. At 10¹⁵, I weighed. Weighed 155 lbs. before breakfast. I left Omura on the 11¹⁵ train, arriving at Kumamoto at 12²⁵. In P.M., I did various things - chiefly attended to my mail. Recd. some post from Jacob, John and Rev. E. P. Conrad. Sent off several. Conrad says that in the "visitor" is the Nakata photo of myself and the Japanese. This "Visitor" has not yet come to me. John says that on the day on which he sent his card, he was being transferred from New Port News to Washington. Wada san wants one of the missionaries to come to Omura to live in the near future.

FRIDAY, NOV. 8, 1907

It was quite cold all day. In A.M. went to the bank and drew out 100 yen. Sent 16.36 to Wada San. Sent 9⁹⁰ to Miss Young at Nagasaki. Paid 39.45 to my teacher as salary and rent. In P.M. I had my Eng. class. The advanced class did not come. At night had my Bible class. During the P.M. class, Mr. ~~Zaid~~ called. I prepared my Oct. financial report to send to Dr. Holland. Will do so tomorrow. To-day, I took from the garden the Hyacinth bulbs which I potted on Sept. 20. I now place them in greenhouse since they have taken good root. Made a few ornaments call at the Davison's. In evening, I wrote three letters, one to each of the chw-gakko students who painted the pictures presented to me last Saturday. Must have a fire tomorrow if the weather continues so cool.

Spent AM. in study. The rickshaman began work in the garden. He will probably finish Monday, when I will plant the strawberry plants which I brought from Mrs. Peeke's garden a few days ago. In P.M. my cook pickled the beans which I had him buy a week ago - sweet pickle. I opened my goods which came from San Francisco almost a month ago. I find one bar of ivory soap lacking, and instead of two cans chipped beef. I find a can of chicken and one of another kind of meat. Put the fruit in glass jars as much as I could, but the jars were not enough to hold all. At night, wrote to Dr. Holland enclosing report for Oct. This AM. I thought that the Japanese had become much easier. I think it will gradually go easier from now. I hope to put in a full week next week.

Went to S.S. and church in A.M. and to services at night. In A.M. there were 16 present. At night? Had 3 in my Eng. Bible Class. In P.M., I read about 60 pages from Comparative Religions - Kellogg. At 5³⁰ went to Mr. Painter's where services were held. Two gentlemen from Nagasaki were there, being guests of Mr. Mann's. One of them told me that when I was in Nagasaki last Spring he called on me in my absence to have me preach at their Union Service. I had not known it before. In A.M. at church. Mr. Yamamoto gave me four pages of a letter to the Ch. Visitor to translate into English. will do so as soon as I can. This is only about half of it, he says. A Christian who recently returned from a 7 yrs. stay in Seattle was church with his wife at night.

I spent the day very profitably in study. In A.M. had Mr. Takahashi. Just after dinner, I sent off a money order to Mr. Yonemura of 8⁰⁰ yen. 7⁰⁰ yen for insurance on Mr. Winter's household property, and one yen as a deficit in acc. which I was at Kurume on 4th inst. In P.M. I worked on the translation of the article Mr. Yamamoto gave me yesterday which is to be published in the "Visitor". I got along with it very well, but the first paragraph is very difficult. Will have to get him to help me on that. In P.M. I began to set my bulbs in the garden, but it began to rain, so I began to translate. It rained quite a bit. At about 7⁰⁰ o'clock, it thundered quite a bit. I find a large hole in my bicycle ty'le. How did it get there, since I last used it?

The day was beautiful. Spent AM. in study with Mr. Saka hashi. In P.M. I began to work in the garden when Mr. Yamamoto came. We talked a while, he helped me in the translation of his letter to the "Ch. Visitor" a little. Then we had our Monthly account at 4³⁰ as soon as he left, I went to the tennis court, where I found Mr. & Mrs. Painter, and Mr. Mann. We played Croquet. At 7³⁰ P.M. I went to Yokomachi Chapel, entered the door and waited about 15 min. but no sign of preaching. I did not make myself known, but left, taking a walk, returned at 7³⁰. I found the services begun. I was very glad for I had apprehended the fear that Mr. Sakahashi was slighting his duty. Mr. Yamamoto, also Mr. Kurhi, were present.

spent AM. in study. Had a gardener work in the garden all day. In P.M. I planted all the hyacinth, tulip, and iris, bulbs that I had, and as many of the daffodil bulbs, and tulips - probably 200 or more. In evening, after entertaining Mr. Kamura and his friend for a while, I planted the 40 strawberry plants I brought from Mr. Beebe's the 5th inst. Also transplanted a few of my own. Potted 4 hyacinth bulbs for forcing. Expected American mail, but none came. At night wrote to Jacob, also to Sonn. Post. to Mother. The weather is warmer, since the thunderstorm we had Monday evening. The chrysanthemums in the garden are fine. I love them more & more as I see them. Felt a slight touch of indigestion to-day. Hope it is only for to-day. A most beautiful moon at night. Sky perfectly clear. Uncle from Beebe say he now gets out a little.

Received 45 yen from back in P.M. Fair.

Spent A.M. in study 1½ hrs of which was with my teacher. I asked him at the close of our study if he was willing to go there at the present arrangement until the first of the year as our contract had expired at the last of Oct. He replied that he was, and also asked that he be made a teacher in the school to be established. In P.M. did a little work in the garden. Only one student came to my Eng. class in P.M. At night Mr. Teachers came. At 4 P.M. went to the tennis court. At 7 P.M. went to the Nihon Kinen Kai to-kai to the regular monthly joint meeting. About 50 were present. Mr. Iwahashi & Mr. Matsuo spoke. Took my bicycle to the shop in P.M. and had two punctures repaired. Nice weather. American Mail came.

Notice in the "news" the marriage of cousin Fair.

Spent A.M. in study, 1½ hrs of which was with Mr. Iwahashi. Finished reading "Isumi to wa Nan zo ja," by Rev. S. Ogata. I have made a good deal of progress while reading this little book. Yesterday, I bought a fine Japanese Bible of our member Mr. who lives at Nakatsu, who is a regular Bible agent. It cost 3.75. Had only one student in my Eng. class in P.M. At night 4 came to teachers class. Reid, a card from Mr. Wada in P.M., relative to my going to Omita on Sunday. Answered it. Took a little bicycle ride just before supper. Nice weather, but became a little cloudy in evening. Did some work in the garden in P.M. Timo came to repair bath-tub smoke pipe as it had rotted down.

In A.M. rec'd. an invitation to eat Thanksgiving dinner at Mr. Peck's. Mrs. Peck say they will have the turkey. It will be on 21st. & one week early as Mr. P. will be absent on the 28th. I answer declining. I can not take the time. Had my teacher write a letter to Mr. Heda also a card to Ryohsei. In P.M. did a little work in the garden. Finished translating Maomari's article to the "Ch. Visitor". At night Mr. Ojima helped me some on the opening page. That was very difficult. The weather has turned much warmer. Had my cook buy a bottle of wine today. I want it for the Lord's Supper at Omata tomorrow evening. Must get up early in the morning so as to practice on the scripture lesson of tomorrow, as I did not get to study them tonight.

Went to S.S. & Church in Am. At the Ch. services Mr. Kusano, a Medical Student, became a Kyudoshia. There were 19 at preaching. Mrs. Yamamoto succeeded in entering the Hakata Hospital a day or two ago, after waiting there two weeks for the opportunity. Left on the 1²⁴ train for Omata where I administered the communion to 14 at night. 5 were received as Kyudoshia. I found that Mr. Painter was also there and gave communion to his members at night. Dr. Davison was also there and gave communion to his people. He also baptized 5. We now have Korean in our church at Omata. He came to Japan to enter school, but is now working at Omata. A fine day. I noticed in an old news that cousin Linda Snyder was recently married to a Mr. Folts.

Left Omura on the 8th on train arriving at home at about 11th. Mr. Wada went to the station to see me off. I at once began to write on my typewriter the letter which Mr. Yamamoto wrote to Grace Ch. S. School, Winchester and which I translated. Finished it at 3rd P.M. and took it to Mr. Yamamoto to let him see it before I sent it off. I then at once began to write a minesgraph letter. It will be the last one I will write, as Mr. Brown is soon to come. Possibly he is just about now leaving Salem, Va. There were 25 at our Omura meeting last night. Prepared a box of chosen ones to send to Eula et home, as a Christmas gift.

It rained all day. Spent AM in study. I used another method this morning. I first read several pages from Yukin Nō Na-mashū and then had my teacher criticise the pronunciation. Then had him ask me various questions on the text. I must use this method more. In P.M. I finished writing the 9th minesgraph letter. Copied it on the stencil paper, and was just about ready to begin to print it when Rev. Hordecker came in. He spent the night with me. Was glad for a little sociality, even at the cost of my evenings work. This is likely my last letter of this kind as Mr. Brown will return in time for the next one. It was such a cold damp day that I had a fire made in the stove at noon.

Got up at 5⁰⁰ Am. and saw Rev. Hondeink off. I did some studying from then until 10⁰⁰ when my teacher came. As soon as he left I began to get my mimeograph ready. Found I had to have a new skeleton roller. Was fortunate enough to be able to get it in Kumamoto immediately after dinner. I began printing it off. Finished at about 4³⁰. Run off 55 copies of 12 pages each. At night prepared them for the mail. The day was fine. The night is as clear as can be, and the moon being full or appearing so makes a most delightful scene. Some girls from the girls school called in P.M. to have me teach them English. I told them I could not start a new class before Christmas, but probably could after New Year. They are from the Buddhist school. Had rather expected some American mail, but it came not.

A beautiful day. Spent A.M. in study. In P.M. took my bicycle to the shop. Had a new valve put in the front tire, as the old one no longer held wind. Had new balls put in the crank bearings, as the old ones had worn somewhat, and gave the cranks too much play, thereby causing a noise. Also bought a pump for carrying on the wheel. At 4³⁰ went to the tennis court. Had some good exercise. At evening mailed the mimeograph letter. Wrote a short letter to Mr. Kephart. The night is again most beautiful. Wrote a note to Enka and a short letter to Mother. Tried to send Enka a box of ore, but the Tsuboi P.O. man demands that the box be wrapped with oil paper. I will try at the central office tomorrow, just for interest. I think this one likes to show authority.

In A.M. I had my teacher as usual. Recd. a letter from Mr. Heda giving me a most discouraging report of the Saga work. I surely hope Rev. Brown will be here soon, so that one of us can go to Saga to work.

Mura San returned to Saga on 10th inst. he says, after an absence of 10 days or more, to see her sick relative. Just after dinner, I went to Dr. Brown's where I got 17 blackberry vines, and planted them in my garden on returning.

In P.M. had but one boy in my Eng. Class. I think I will discontinue the class after next week, if no others come. At night, had four in my teacher's Bible class. It was a rainy day most of the day. I greatly admire the beautiful Chrysanthemums in the garden. They are fine.

I then studied with him one hour. Heretofore I have been reading them from my Romaji-Japanese Bible. Began raining while at the school exercises.

Did some reviewing on Isuru to wa han zo ya. At night did some composition. I must now do a little of this every day, if possible. Cook San became very sick last night and is still so today. He called the dr. at 1⁰⁰ o'clock last night. It is something like asthma I think. This is the coldest weather we have had this winter. I am paying .60 yen per 100 km for coal this year.

Asa san appears more active than I ever saw it. It was most beautiful. Returning, Mr. Yamamoto called. He now wants 20⁰ yen on his wife's hospital expenses which I promised to pay for him. Will give it to him tomorrow. I did not have it today. Called on Mr. Mann for a few moments. At night went to the Johomachi Chapel and waited for 35 minutes, but no preaching. Getting without letting myself be made known.

Took 20 yen and gave to Naomaru to send to Nakata Hospital for his wife's treatment. In evening I did some studying. I am now reading one up the articles in the Report of Street's Fed. Conference of Tokyo each evening after supper. It is very interesting. No mail comes. Mr. Mann was to have come to take a walk today, but the rain prevented. Paid servants salary in evening.

THANKSGIVING DAY. *Cloudy Fair.*

The day was rather cold with muddy streets which became a little better in evening. In A.M. while studying with Mr. Iakahoshi. Mr. Tomonochi came in. He had a letter from Ryohki also a telegram from his wife. Her operation was to take place this A.M. in the Nakata hospital. She asked him to come. He left on the 1²⁴ P.M. train. I am glad she has had the operation. I hope she will now get well. In P.M. did a little studying after pulling the grass out of the strawberries. At 4⁴⁵ P.M. I went to tennis court where I enjoyed the games with Mr. & Mrs. Painter against Mr. Mann & I. I just happened to think. Today one year ago, I planted my strawberries. Today I weeded them. Sent some out to mother also to Mr. J. E. Cooper. Studied at night. The Japanese is slowly opening up.

Spent until 11:30 A.M. in study. American mail came, bringing a letter from Mother, and one from Mr. Holland. Dr. Holland says, and also the "visitor," that Rev. Brown has typhoid fever and is in Charlotte in the hospital. Dr. H. says that Rev. Mill will sail on the Minnesota which was to start from Seattle today. He of course comes alone since Mr. Brown can't. Noticed in the Visitor that Dr. K. A. Price and Miss Jessie Helbert were married. Mother says Vernon has given up his position in the store in Laramie and may go in business with Uncle Jake. In P.M. I had my beginners Eng. Class. 2 came. At night five came to the teachers class. This was the coldest day we have had this season. Snow on P.O. Jan a few days ago. rode to the Central P.O. after dinner. My cook is much better today.

At no time during the day was the thermometer above 44°. The coldest day this season. Rec'd. a letter from Rev. L.S.C. Miller, saying that he expected to sail on the Minne State, leaving Seattle Nov. 29. He will come to Nagasaki. Rec'd. one from Rev. L. Johnson, St. Louis. One from Mr. John A. Cline, containing check of \$216.62. This was written on Oct. 8.— 3 days later than Dr. Holloman which was rec'd. yesterday. Mr. Cline says Mr. Brown is improving a little. After dinner, took a bicycle ride. At 4³⁰ Mr. Jima came to teach me an hour. At 5³⁰ Mr. Mann came to take a walk. We went to Sugenji, sent letters to Mr. Cline and Rev. L. Johnson. Sent my check to Mr. Walrord in Nagasaki to have it cashed. This is a new method. I will see how it works. US Cook san is sick, the Rickshaman filled the bath and swept the yard this evening.

In P.M. I took a long bicycle ride. Then went to Mr. Painter's for services. After services at the ch. at night, Mr. Thinsty came in. Mr. Nishimura the Saga Christian who died in San Francisco a few months ago will be buried at Saga on Thursday at 2 P.M. Naomaru will preach the funeral. The man's body was cremated. The bones came by parcel post, I suppose. This was the coldest day this season. A heavy frost was on the ground this Am. A very clear sky tonight. Read the two Ch. visitors which came a few days ago, one Reformation Number.

So far this morning was the coldest. The ground was frozen quite much, as it was also yesterday morning. Yesterday we had our first frost. Studied in AM but felt very cross etc., I have slept only a little during the few nights. This accounts for it. After dinner I rode my wheel out to the orange grove, quite a distance from Kumamoto. I went and returned in about 2³⁰ hours. I enjoyed the trip but was disappointed in not seeing more oranges. Just before supper time Mr. Yamamoto called. He wanted a little money. Cook San is now thinking of consulting the Soga specialist, Yoshioha, who treated me in the Spring. I hope he will. The "Japan Mail" does not have the "Minnesota" on board at all. It was supposed to have sailed Nov. 29. They have others of later date.

After drawing 350 yen from the bank, I left on the 11²⁴ Am. train reaching Omata at 1.02. I stopped until the next train, reaching Kurume at about 2⁴⁵, I likewise stopped here until the 6⁰⁰ o'clock train on which I left for Hakata, reaching the latter place about 7²⁰ P.M. I found Mr. Yonezawa at Kurume sick in bed. He has been ill since Nov. 24, he says. At Omata I found things in the ordinary condition. It is now probable that we will have our baptisms there on Christmas evening instead of Dec. 22, the object being so that it will not interfere with my meeting Mr. Miller in Nagasaki at about that time. Also, so that he can be present. Reaching Hakata, I went to the Benin hotel where I took a hot bath and tried to get a good rest.

In A.M. I went over to Hakata-shima where I bought two nice picture frames for two of the pictures presented to me by the Chugakko students. I then went to Mr. Yamamoto's home at about 10^{oclock} but he was absent, necessitating me to wait for him until 11³⁰. We then transacted our business, and I returned to the hotel for dinner after which I returned to Mr. Y. and Mrs. Y. went with me to the hospital to see Naomaru's wife who was operated on last Thursday. She is getting along nicely. She says she will be back in Kumamoto by Christmas. I left Hakata on the 3rd train arriving at Saga at about 5³⁰. Went to the Koenkwan. After supper, I called on the Reepes. Went with Mr. Hordelink & Hoepke to Prayer meeting.

Ther. THURSDAY, DEC. 5, 1907 Wea.
Rain.

At about 9⁰⁰, I called at Mr. Neda's but he was absent, making preparations for the funeral of Mr. Mishimura. I then went to Mr. Mishimura's but Mr. Neda was not there. I then found him at the church. At 2⁰⁰ P.M. the services began at the house. Then the procession went to the church where Naomaru preached the sermon. Then to the cemetery where the final services were held. The church was filled. Mr. Mishimura Hideyoshi was 28 yrs. old. was wounded in the Japanese-Russian war, then went to San Francisco where he died on Sept. 28. He was cremated, and the bones sent back to Saga. The funeral was purely Christian, but before the service began I saw a relative - a non Christian go before the box containing the bones and worship the dead person. It was a very well conducted service. The other members of the family have been lax after members of the church duties but a few others in their church duties have a few others.

Finished reading the New Testament for the second time this year. Wrote to Ogata San. In P.M. I went to the bank, had my check of yen \$31.91 cashed, 375 yen placed on my acc. deposited 30 yen in P.O. In AM I paid salary to Mr. Iakahashi. At 3:30 Mr. Igima came. After teaching me a while, just a little before 4:00 P.M. Mr. Mann called for me to take a walk with him. As it was about time to stop with my teacher, I went with him to the river near the Kaini Kumamoto station. He now tells me that he has a postal from his lady saying that the board will probably not let her come out to be married to him leaving Eng. Dec. 10. This is the fourth time she & he have been disappointed.

I was very lazy this A.M. not getting up until almost 8 o'clock. I felt ashamed of myself in reading the Gospel lesson at church. I had not sufficiently prepared for it. There were 17 at ch. in A.M. and 5 at night. At 5³⁰ P.M. went to Mr. Painter for services. Mr. Painter being absent, and Mrs. P. having a headache not feeling like playing the organ, the regular services were dispensed with. Mr. Mann read the scripture lessons and a sermon from some book, and some prayers for the day. At 4³⁰ P.M. called at the Davison's, but Mr. D. was absent and Mrs. D. was at S.S. Read some from Tokyo's St. Int. Ed. Conference Report. A postal from Mr. Heda says that the 2 yr. old son of Mr. Hishimura who was buried on Thursday died on Saturday. It makes it quite sad for the family.

Bought a cannon shell vase for containing water on the stove, so as to put some moisture in the atmosphere. In P.M. I prepared the Mission financial report for Nov. At night wrote to Dr. Holland. At 4³⁰ P.M. Mr. Yamouchi called and we had our monthly settlement. I was able to do but little studying today. While at supper, a note came from Mrs. Davison. I said it began raining at about 5³⁰ P.M. The day was somewhat warmer than usual. Just before dinner, I wrote to the N.Y.K. at Kobe enquiring whether or not Mr. Miller coming on the "Minnesota" could come by rail from Kobe or whether he could be transferred to a N.Y.K. boat and land at Moji.

It was then too late; just as I began to write just now, I noticed that one of the five gold fish which Abing People gave me on Dec. 6, was dying. I saw it move its last. Prepared two pr. chopsticks to send to Dr. K. & Price and wife. I rec'd. an invitation to their marriage this A.M. Wrote to M. Prager & Co. Seattle, for a Catalogue of Shds. I put in a very good day at study today. The day was warmer than usual. This is, I suppose, 11 days from Seattle for Rev. Miller.

Spent A.M. and part of P.M. in study. Went to bank where I rec'd. 50 yen. I tried to find a glass bowl for my gold-fish, but was unsuccessful. Ordered a suit of clothes to be made - price 35 yen. It is to be finished by the 20th. At 6th P.M. went to the Seiyokan where the English Society held a banquet. Cost was 1 yen each. After the supper, we had a most enjoyable evening playing various games, such as Commandram, sending mail between places (fruit basket). Another game with chairs, the name of which I do not know, was very interesting. I was much surprised to see how the 20 persons, all of whom were older than myself - some much older - could engage in the games that I used to play when a mere boy. The Japanese seem to retain the child nature. Painter, Mann & Clark, & I were the foreigners present. I won 4th prize on commandram - a certain basket.

Last night my tooth gave me considerable pain, so today just after noon, I went to the dentist. He removed an old filling, and will refill it Monday. American mail came. A letter from Mother one from Presby. Min. Fund. etc. I fear Mother will not get to eat the box she prepared for me. It seems that she was not aware of Rev. Miller's coming. Her letter was written on Nov. 15, and Rev. Miller used to have sailed Nov. 29. Ezra is about to enter Lenoir College. In P.M. Mr. Yamamoto called. He asks for a raise in salary. I feel sure he has heard that Government's salary has been increased, and he can not bear being behind. It is just what I expected when the Danes raised Governor's salary. Wrote a letter to Rev. Miller to reach him when he lands at Yokohama.

I there found that he was to come on the 12²⁵ train. So I returned and went to the hotel a little later where he was given this dinner. It was the first time for me to meet the new Bishop who is the first native Japanese Bishop, being elected last May. - Methodist. Dr. Davidson called at noon to inquire about Mr. Brown's case of fever. I have heard nothing of it since the first news came on Nov. 29. In P.M. had my one student for English. At night, my class of teachers came. I gave them 30 min. graphophone playing, before I began to teach them. Had the 45th Psalm. I was much impressed with the richness and clearness of this Psalm as a Messianic Psalm. It is a treasure.

He severely rebuked them when they did not sing as he thought they ought, while at the same time his mistakes in the singing were worse than theirs. No word at preaching. I had Mr. Mann take dinner with me. By invitation I took supper at Painter's. Mr. Painter was absent however. We dispensed with night services and went to the Methodist Ch. where Bishop Honda preached a very simple and earnest sermon. I am more than ever, this evening enthused in trying to prepare a sermon to preach. I shall try it.

Spent Am. in study. Hour was with my teacher. I mentioned that this would be a part of the church furniture. He gave a short answer today that they would like Omura, give to f the price. He also told me to get it by the 20th. I think I will answer him, agreeing to do as at Omura and as Omura waited until some one made a special contribution for that purpose, so will we in this case. In P.M. I took a ride out on my wheel bought some stamps and had the picture frame brought which I ordered ^{mail} last week. At night I wrote several pages on my first Japanese sermon. I wonder how much my teacher will change it.

A most beautiful day. Tonight is a glorious moonlight night. Studied in Am. Had my teacher write letters for me to Masa San and to Ayohei San. At 1:00 P.M. My tailor was to come to fit the suit on me, but he did not come until 1:45, just as I was going to the dentist. The dentist renewed the gum filling in the one tooth and took out another small gum filling which was giving me trouble. This had just been put in by Dr. Moriyama of Nagasaki in July. Put up stoves in dining room and guest room. Had the boy do general cleaning, especially in the guest room. On my way from dentist, I stopped at the tailor's and tried on my suit. At 4:30, Mr. Mann called and we took a walk to Sugenji. Just as I returned I recd. the following telegram from Yokohama. "Arrived Yokohama Tuesday. Due Nagasaki twenty-fourth. Miller." I guess he had not yet recd. my letters wrote to mother. Went to Yokohama Chapel at 7:00 P.M.

Mr. Ijima came and helped me with my study. Just before he left Mr. Peele came in. He is on his return from a month's tour in the Kagoshima district. Got up at 6⁰⁰ Am. At 7²⁵ Mr. Peele started for the station. Yesterday AM Mr. Yamamoto called to discuss the Christmas entertainment. I wanted to give 15 yen for myself and the mission but he wanted 25⁰⁰. I finally agreed to make it 20. This year's Christmas appropriations as follows: Kumamoto 20⁰⁰, Omata 5⁰⁰, Hakata 5⁰⁰, and Saga 15⁰⁰. All of this is money left over from the amt. sent last year through Mrs. Habenicht, except 6⁴⁵ which I give myself. Last year I gave 22⁰⁰ yen but could not afford so much this year as I have to pay for Heinrich's wife in the hospital, which is already 40⁰⁰ yen. I do not know yet how much more. In A.M. I read from Heinrich's "Turquin". At 2⁰⁰ P.M. went to the dentist again. He filled one tooth with cement and said that it would last 4 yrs. Bought a spread for the small study table. Took some things out of the guest room so that Mr. Miller could occupy it. Potted some corn at night and strung it for Christmas tree. I must have been home most of the night.

was winter & so me a Christmas card.

This A.M. I finished reading the Old Testament. This makes one time for the O.T. and 2 times for the N.T. Since May 16th after my reading course will be between Jan. 1 and Jan. 1. I mean to do this every year. Have done it twice since I came to Japan. Begun it May 2, 1906. In P.M. I went out and bought 6 silk Handfs. as presents for some of our Hakata folks. Mr. & Mrs. Yamamoto and 4 members who gave me a present last year. Recd. 2 Graphophone Records a present from Rev. Lippard. Had to pay yen 1.10 duty. In evening had Hatanaka San in Eng. Study. At night I had my regular Bible class, & came. While teaching it a telegram came from Mr. Miller saying that he would land at Nagasaki Sunday morning. Mr. Miller did not want to be delayed so long, so we came straight to Kumamoto. After supper I called at Mr. Yamamoto's to see if I could do any work on the Christmas decoration. I met him at the gate going to Mr. Sakahashi's. None to do tonight. Will go around to work tomorrow. Mr. Miller & I did not retire until after 11⁰⁰ o'clock. We must become more temperate. It is nice to have company.

In A.M. I divided the presents Mr. Miller brought from America. Then took those for the Kumamoto S.School over to the pastor's home. They seemed to fit in very nicely. At 1³⁰ Mr. Miller and I went over to the church and helped put presents and decorations on the Christmas tree. We were there until 4⁴⁵ P.M., At 11⁰⁰ A.M. We went to the Central P.O. where we mailed some letters & postals of Christmas greetings. ate supper at 5⁰⁰ P.M. and went to the ch. immediately. Exercises began at 6⁰⁰ P.M. A good audience assembled. The Selections of songs and Scripture recitations by the children were well done. It was Mr. Miller's first Christmas. The tree made a good effect. Returned home at 10¹⁵, did not retire until 12³⁰. Mr. Miller was doing some unpacking in the meantime.

In A.M. Mrs. Davison sent me a jar of spiced figs. After going down street and buying a full & a horse & wagon for Rev. Clark's children, and some kibbitz for our workers, Mr. Miller & I went to Mr. Clark's where we took dinner. Mr. & Mrs. Davison were also there. It was an excellent dinner. I had to leave at 1¹⁵ to go to Omura. Mr. Miller followed on the 4⁴⁵ train. I had to rush through before the others. I arrived at Omura at 2⁰⁰. Went to the chapel where I found the people at work on the Christmas. I returned to the Hotel and at 5⁴⁵, met Mr. Miller at the train. After the regular service in the ch. book, I baptized 6 persons. Before the service began, a short examination was held. They were: Sakai Nodayuki, Noda Usaburo, Saki Shigeki, Miyagi Teijiro, Furukawatori, Shigeo, Tokunaga Sumporo (female). After this the Christmas exercises began. Then the presents. The games of drawing were rather lively.

Left Omura on the 1:30 P.M. train arriving at Saga at 3²⁰. By 4²⁰ P.M. we were ready to go to bed in the hotel. Slept until about 8⁰⁰ o'clock. Then called on Mr. Heda. Then at the Kindergarten. Then on Mr. Heda again. At 1⁰⁰ P.M. went to the church. The Christmas exercises did not begin until about 2⁰⁰ P.M. The presents which we took over, together with what they had previously bought, made a very good showing. Mr. Miller sang with Miss Itagaki on a duet. Then with Itagaki, Kawash, + Mura in a quartette. Left on the 6⁰⁰ P.M. train for Hakata, where we arrived at 7³⁰. After staying at the hotel, we immediately went to Mr. Yamamoto's. Mr. Baba was also there. He amused Mr. Miller by his excessive bowing. Mrs. J. returned from Saga just as we were leaving. A pleasant evening.

Most excellent weather. A little before 7⁰⁰ A.M. the hotel servant called us. We at once got up and went to the depot, leaving on the 7²⁰ train, arriving at Kurume at about 9³⁰. After spending the interval with Mr. Tomimura and Matsumoto, we left on the 10⁴⁰ train, arriving at Kumamoto at 12⁴⁰. Cook had dinner ready for us on our arrival. From 7⁰⁰ P.M. the folks came to give Mr. Miller a reception. Only 10 persons came. After a short service, games were played, while the graphophone was running. The evening was very nicely spent, but Mr. Miller was somewhat disappointed at not seeing more people come out. They stayed until 10⁰⁰, retired at about 12⁰⁰ o'clock. Too late. Did business at banks in P.M.

In A.M. after breakfast, Mr. Miller & I called at Dr. Davidson's and he went with us to the coal place near the Kasuga station. Here we enquired about the coal that comes from Amaza. He being necessitated to meet the 12th train did not have time to go with us to Naragaki. So Mr. Miller & I rode alone. We found the proper man and ordered 1000 kiu to be brought on Monday. Returning, we ordered 500 kiu from another store near the station, as we had not enough to last until Monday. It was a good ride out there. Ordered 100 visiting cards for Mr. Miller on our return. Did not get to dinner until 1:30 P.M. Was quite hungry. Did various things in P.M. Mr. Painter & Mann called at 5:30 P.M. Rec'd note of thanks from Mrs. Baek for skirt blouse, also an invitation to New Year's dinner. I had to decline.

In A.M. went to S. School and church. About 30 came out to S.S. in all. Mr. Yamamoto gave a talk to all instead of dividing up into classes, as usual. Mrs. Yamamoto returned last night from Nakata where she had been in the hospital. She is not entirely recovered from her operation, but Maomaen telegraphed for her to come, to make the children's New Year clothes. Were at church. Also were at ch. at night. At 4th P.M. Mr. Miller and I called at the Davison's. Miss Russell, Miss Young, & Miss Finley were there, having come yesterday. At 5th P.M. we went to Mr. Painter's to their regular service. Mr. Mann was also there. Tonight is a most beautiful starlight night. In P.M. it became a little cooler. At ch. at night, Mr. Iakahashi gave Mr. Miller & I some Mochi. Beautiful day.

In A.M. went to station to have Mr. Miller's books sent up, but because of Mr. Walker's not sending the bill of lodgings, I could not get them from the station. Bought a lamp chimney for the Rochester lamp. Drew 100 yen from the P.O. At 12³⁰ Mr. Miller & I went to Dr. Davidson's where we took dinner. At 4⁰⁰ P.M. Misses Russell & Young returned to Nagasaki. I returned home to meet Mrs. Yamamoto who was to have come at 4⁰⁰ o'clock. He did not come, so I returned to the Davidson's at 6⁰⁰. Took supper there also, as they urged it when I left at 4⁰⁰. We played flick and crohono at night also in P.M. Miss Finley also played cards while at home. Mrs. Yamamoto called to thank me for paying her hospital expenses (60 yen) for her operation. She returned Saturday night. Some American mail came. J. T. [unclear] Miss Schuff. John wrote. Some papers also.

went to dentist at 2:00 P.M. & had my gall gallbladder removed. After prayers, Mr. Miller & I went down street to see the sample of the visiting cards he is having made. Bought several articles in the line of stationery. On our return called at Mr. Yamamoto's. Paid his Jan. salary, and current expenses for Dec. He again asks for an increase of salary. He also says Mr. Sakahashi very much wants his own salary increased. I will consider the matter with Mr. Miller, but would greatly prefer waiting until Mr. Brown returns. At night my cook also asked for an increase of salary. I will see what we can do. Sent off a number of our postals to our workers etc. Bought a toy automobile and sent it to Songo Pleke at Saga. Mr. Iida called in P.M. bringing me a nice bronze flower vase as a present from my Eng. class. Mr. Miller & I took an inventory of the food stuffs now on hand. We found 4 yen 66.54. From now he will share with me in the eating expenses. Did not retire until 12:30. Saw the new year come in. Sent a letter to mother which I wrote yesterday. (over)

Summary of Events of 1907.

MEMORANDA

Those things which I, at this time, remember most prominently are as follows: On Jan. 18, my father died, at the age of 62 yrs. 10 mos. and 21 days. Internal eczema is said to have been the causl. He had been declining for about 7 mos. before. On June 6 I entered Dr. Yoshioka's hospital at Saga where I spent five weeks during which time, I underwent two operations on my nose. These have been immensely beneficial, in fact they have made it possible for me to save my health. After leaving the hospital, I went to Zinger where I spent the summer vacation. Rev. Brown and family, together with Mr. L. S. G. Miller whom the mission board called to the work in Japan, were expected to arrive in Japan in Oct. but were delayed. However Rev. Miller came alone at a later date, reaching the field Dec. 22. Mr. Brown having been detained because of typhoid fever, from which he is now recovering. Rev. Brown & Rev. Miller were both made D.D.'s by Senior College. \$25,000 were raised by Dr. Brown for a school in Japan. During the time since my

return from the summer vacation, I have made encouraging advancement in my study of Japanese. Since my operations, I have had a better memory, and could consequently acquire more. In June, Miss Ella B. Schuff, of the General Synod South. Mission at Guntur India arrived in Japan of her return to America, spending one night in Saga. I had been alone in the mission since Oct. 1906 until Mr. Miller came on Dec. 22. Of course he is yet new and unacquainted with the work, consequently I must necessarily have the responsibility until one of the other families return. I am much pleased with Rev. Miller as a companion. I think we will be able to get along nicely. Closing the old year, while all things did not come about as I might have wished, I am yet profoundly thankful to the good Lord for His innumerable blessings.




